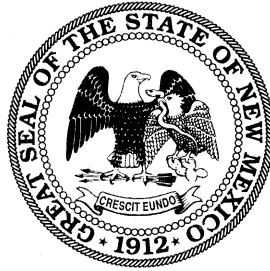

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I. INTRODUCTION

A. PURPOSE OF THIS REQUEST FOR PROPOSALS

The Team Nutrition grant is a United States Department of Agriculture funded Grant designed to help schools learn how to prepare healthy meals that appeal to students. The two-year grant will also assist schools in developing a webpage designed to empower students to make informed and healthy choices in their school cafeterias. The goals of the Team Nutrition grant are to help children develop better eating and physical activity habits and are a key component in the efforts of USDA to provide schools with nutrition education.

Through the grant and collaboration with a culinary specialist, we will be able to do the following:

- 1) Develop, test and market recipes that adhere to the U.S. 2005 Dietary Guidelines and appeal to students;
- 2) Conduct trainings for school food service managers and staff to learn how to prepare healthy, minimally- processed meals, gain skills to incorporate the newly developed recipes into school menus, and learn how to conduct a nutritional analysis of school menus;
- 3) Develop a webpage that provides nutritional information to students, parents and teachers so students can make informed and healthy food choices in and out of school, and
- 4) Present nutrition and physical activity messages and initiatives in which students can participate.

B. VISION

The vision of the New Mexico Public Education Department (NMPED) is to provide a world-class education system in which all New Mexican students are prepared to succeed in a diverse and complex world.

The NMPED's mission is to provide leadership, technical assistance and quality assurance to improve performance and close the achievement gap.

The Team Nutrition grant will contribute to the agency's goals by helping children develop enhanced eating and physical activity habits. Studies demonstrate contributions such as these lead to positive learning outcomes and life long eating and physical activity habits.

C. SUMMARY SCOPE OF WORK

A Culinary Specialist will develop and implement a program in conjunction with the New Mexico Public Education Department and the Student Nutrition Bureau, as well as the Santa Fe Public School District and the Santa Fe Indian School. The contractor shall:

1. Train kitchen managers to learn how to prepare meals that adhere to the 2005 Dietary Guidelines for Americans and USDA National School Lunch Program requirements.
2. Conduct bi-weekly one hour training sessions for Santa Fe Public School and Santa Fe Indian

School kitchen managers at their respective locations.

3. Develop new recipes that conform to the state and federal nutritional guidelines and ensure the cost per meal for school lunch and breakfast meals are fully reimbursable.
4. Select a group of children to test the newly developed recipes to ensure they are healthy and appeal to students.
5. Generate standardized recipes in the USDA format and produce home versions.
6. Collaborate with the NM Student Nutrition Bureau to conduct regional trainings to be held in the Gallup, Las Cruces and Albuquerque areas.
7. Conduct workshops at state and regional school nutrition conferences focusing on healthy cooking practices and the preparation of newly developed recipes.
8. Promote good nutrition by focusing on increasing the amount and variety of whole grains, increased fruit and vegetables, and decreased sodium, saturated fats, trans fats and total fats.
9. Work with the NM Commodities Bureau to enhance the flexibility of commodity foods available to help reach project goals.
10. The Culinary Specialist will work with the Santa Fe Public Schools staff to prepare a video taping for the National Food Service Management Institutes "Cook for Kids" program. The focus will be on preparing healthy and student-friendly southwest meals.
11. Collaborate with the NM Student Nutrition Bureau to produce a booklet of the newly developed recipes in USDA format. Each school district will receive a complementary copy of the recipes. The booklet will also be made available on-line.

D. SCOPE OF PROCUREMENT

The scope of procurement is the services of a culinary specialist to develop and implement a program in conjunction with the NM Student Nutrition Bureau, Santa Fe Public Schools and the Santa Fe Indian Schools. The services obtained from the culinary specialist will include recipe development and implementation; training sessions with foodservice managers with the focus on demonstrating healthy cooking techniques, preparation of new recipes, and discussion of the nutritional advantages of meals that meet the 2005 dietary guidelines for Americans; statewide workshop presentations; and nutrition promotion. A single source award will be given as a result of this RFP. The contract term is two years.

Any inquiries or request regarding this procurement should be submitted to the Procurement Managers in writing. Offerors may contact **ONLY** the Procurement Managers regarding the procurement. Other state employees do not have the authority to respond on behalf of the Agency.

F. DEFINITION OF TERMINOLOGY

This section contains definitions that are used throughout this procurement document, including appropriate abbreviations.

“Agency” means New Mexico Public Education Department/Student Nutrition Bureau

“Close of Business” means 5:00 PM Mountain Standard or Mountain Daylight Time, whichever is in effect on the date given.

“Culinary Specialist” means the individual selected by the agency to develop and implement a program in conjunction with the Student Nutrition Bureau, Public Education Department, Santa Fe Public School District and Santa Fe Indian School.

“Contract” means any agreement for the procurement of items of tangible personal property, services or construction derived from an ITB or RFP.

“Contract Manager” means the individual selected by the Agency to monitor and manage all aspects of the contract resulting from this RFP.

“Contractor” means an employer contracting with the State of New Mexico, which employer has, had, or anticipates having six (6) or more employees who worked, are working, or are expected to work an average of at least twenty hours per week over a six-month period, with said six month period being at any time during the year prior to seeking the contract(s) with the State, or any time during the term of the contract(s) with the State;

“Deliverable” means any measurable, tangible, verifiable outcome, result, or item that must be produced to complete a project or part of a project.

“Department of Information Technology” means the New Mexico Department of Information Technology which is responsible for operating the data center and all communications related items.

“Desirable”—The terms “may,” “can,” “should,” “preferably,” or “prefers” identify a desirable or

discretionary item or factor (as opposed to “mandatory”).

“**Determination**” means the written documentation of a decision of a procurement manager including findings of fact supporting a decision. A determination becomes part of the procurement file to which it pertains.

“**DFA**” means the Department of Finance and Administration for the State of New Mexico.

“**DFA/CRB**” means the Contracts Review Board of the Department of Finance and Administration for the State of New Mexico.

“**Employer**” means any for-profit or not-for-profit business, regardless of location, that employs one or more persons that qualify as a “New Mexico Employee”. (See below.) Such definition does not include governmental entities.

“**Evaluation Committee**” means a body appointed by the Agency management to perform the evaluation of offeror proposals.

“**Evaluation Committee Report**” means a report prepared by the Procurement Manager and the Evaluation Committee for submission to the State Purchasing Agent for contract award that contains all written determinations resulting from the conduct of a procurement requiring the evaluation of competitive sealed proposals.

“**Finalist**” is defined as an offeror who meets all the mandatory specifications of the Request for Proposal and whose score on evaluation factors is sufficiently high to qualify that offeror for further consideration by the Evaluation Committee.

“**Mandatory**” The terms “must,” “shall,” “will,” “is required,” identify a mandatory item or factor (as opposed to “desirable”). Failure to meet a mandatory item or factor will result in the rejection of the offeror’s proposal.

“**Milestone**” means a significant event in a project, usually the completion of a major deliverable.

“**New Mexico Employee**” means any resident of the State of New Mexico, performing the majority of their work within the State of New Mexico, for any employer regardless of the location of the employer’s office or offices.

“**Offer**” means to make available to all New Mexico employees, without unreasonable restriction, enrollment in one or more health coverage plans and to actively seek and encourage participation in order to achieve the goals of the Executive Order. This could include State publicly financed public health coverage programs such as *Insure New Mexico!*

“**Offeror**” is any person, corporation, or partnership who chooses to submit a proposal.

“**Procurement Manager**” means the person or designee authorized by the Agency to manage or administer a procurement requiring the evaluation of competitive sealed proposals.

“**Request for Proposals**” or “RFP” means all documents, including those attached or incorporated

by reference, used for soliciting proposals.

“Requirements” are obligatory and mean the system functions that are related to the organization’s goals and business opportunities. Requirements are defined by the project team and are usually prioritized.

“Responsive Offer or Responsive Proposal” means an offer or proposal that conforms in all material respects to the requirements set forth in the request for proposals. Material respects of a request for proposals include, but are not limited to, price, quality, quantity or delivery requirements.

“Responsible Offeror” means an offeror who submits a responsive proposal and who has furnished, when required, information and data to prove that his financial resources production, or service facilities, personnel, service reputation, and experience are adequate to make satisfactory delivery of the services or items of tangible personal property described in the proposal.

“Solicited and Awarded” means an ITB or RFP was made available to the general public, through any means, after January 1, 2008 AND the contract(s) sought as a result of that solicitation was/were awarded after January 1, 2008.

“Solicitations” means ITBs and RFPs.

“State (the State)” means the State of New Mexico.

“State Purchasing Agent” or **“SPA”** means the purchasing agent for the State of New Mexico or a designated representative.

G. BACKGROUND INFORMATION

B. EXPLANATION OF EVENTS

The following paragraphs describe the activities listed in the sequence of events shown in Section II, Paragraph A.

1. **Issue of RFP**

This RFP is being issued by the Agency on February 2, 2009.

2. Pre-Proposal Conference

The pre-proposal conference will answer numerous general questions about the procurement and agency requirements, and it will provide valuable feedback on the content of the procurement document itself. This conference will take place on February 23, 2009.

3. Distribution List Response

Potential offerors should hand deliver or return by facsimile or by registered or certified mail the “Acknowledgement of Receipt of Request for Proposals Form” that accompanies this document (See Appendix A) to have their organization placed on the procurement distribution list. This form should be signed by an authorized representative of the organization, dated, and returned by close of business on March 3, 2009 to the procurement manager.

The procurement distribution list will be used for the distribution of written responses to questions and any RFP amendments.

Failure to return this form shall constitute a presumption of receipt and rejection of the RFP, and the potential offeror’s organization name shall not appear on the distribution list.

4. Deadline to Submit Additional Questions

Potential offerors may submit additional written questions as to the intent or clarity of this RFP until close of business of March 27, 2009. All written questions must be addressed to the Procurement Manager (see Section I, Paragraph E).

5. Response to Written Questions/RFP Amendments

Written responses to written questions and any RFP amendments will be distributed on March 31, 2009 to all potential offerors whose organization name appears on the procurement distribution list. An Acknowledgement of Receipt Form will accompany the distribution package. The form should be signed by the offerors representative, dated, and hand-delivered or returned by facsimile or by registered or certified mail by the date indicated thereon. Failure to return this form shall constitute a presumption of receipt and withdrawal from the procurement process. Therefore, the offerors organization name shall be deleted from the procurement distribution list.

Additional written requests for clarification of distributed answers and/or amendments must be received by the Procurement Managers no later than seven (7) days after the answers and/or amendments were issued.

6. Submission of Proposals

ALL OFFEROR PROPOSALS MUST BE RECEIVED FOR REVIEW AND EVALUATION BY THE PROCUREMENT MANAGER OR DESIGNEE NO LATER THAN 5:00 MOUNTAIN DAYLIGHT TIME ON May 12, 2009. Proposals received after this deadline will

not be accepted. The date and time will be recorded on each proposal. Proposals must be addressed and delivered to the Procurement Managers at the address listed in Section I, Paragraph E. Proposals must be sealed and labeled on the outside of the package to clearly indicate a response to the "Team Nutrition" Request for Proposals. Proposals submitted by facsimile will not be accepted.

A public log will be kept of the names of all offeror organizations that submitted proposals. Pursuant to §13-1-116 NMSA 1978, the contents of any proposal shall not be disclosed to competing offerors prior to contract award.

7. Proposal Evaluation

The evaluation of proposals will be performed by an evaluation committee appointed by Agency management. The evaluation process will take place from May 13, 2009. During this time, the Procurement Managers may, at their option, initiate discussion with offerors who submit responsive or potentially responsive proposals for the purpose of clarifying aspects of the proposals, but proposals may be accepted and evaluated without such discussion. Discussions SHALL NOT be initiated by the offerors.

8. Selection of Finalists

The Evaluation Committee will select and the Procurement Manager will notify the finalist offerors on May 15, 2009. Only finalists will be invited to participate in the subsequent steps of the procurement. The schedule for the oral presentations/demonstrations will be determined at this time.

9. Best and Final Offers From Finalists

Finalist offerors may be asked to submit revisions to their proposals for the purpose of obtaining best and final offers by May 21, 2009 NO LATER THAN 5:00 MOUNTAIN DAYLIGHT TIME. Best and final offers may be clarified and amended at the finalist offeror's oral presentation/demonstration.

10. Finalize Contract

The contract will be finalized with the most advantageous offeror by May 25, 2009. In the event that mutually agreeable terms cannot be reached within the time specified, the Agency reserves the right to finalize a contract with the next most advantageous offeror without undertaking a new procurement process or to cancel the award.

11. Contract Award

After review of the Evaluation Committee Report, the recommendation of the Agency management, and the signed contract, the Agency will award the contract on May 28, 2009. This date is subject to change at the discretion of the Agency.

This contract shall be awarded to the offeror whose proposal is most advantageous, taking into consideration the evaluation factors set forth in the RFP. The most advantageous proposal may or may not have received the most points.

12. Protest Deadline

Any protest by an offeror must be timely and in conformance with §13-1-172 NMSA 1978 and applicable procurement regulations. The fifteen (15)-day protest period for responsive offerors shall begin on the day following the contract award and will end as of 5:00 PM Mountain Daylight Time 15 days after the Contract Award. Protests must be written and must include the name and address of the protestor and the request for proposals number. It must also contain a statement of grounds for protest including appropriate supporting exhibits, and it must specify the ruling requested from the Agency. The protest must be delivered to the Secretary of Public Education. The deadline for Protest will be set for June 18, 2009.

Protests received after the deadline will not be accepted.

C. GENERAL REQUIREMENTS

This procurement will be conducted in accordance with the State Purchasing Agent's procurement code regulations, 1.4.1 NMAC.

1. Acceptance of Conditions Governing the Procurement

Offerors must indicate their acceptance of the Conditions Governing the Procurement section in the letter of transmittal. Submission of a proposal constitutes acceptance of the Evaluation Factors contained in Section V of this RFP.

2. Incurring Cost

Any cost incurred by the offeror in preparation, transmittal, presentation of any proposal or material submitted in response to this RFP shall be borne solely by the offeror.

Any cost incurred by the offeror for set up and demonstration of the proposed equipment and/or system shall be borne solely by the offeror.

3. Prime Contractor Responsibility

Any contract that may result from the RFP shall specify that the prime contractor is solely responsible for fulfillment of the contract with the Agency. The Agency will make contract payments only to the prime contractor.

4. Subcontractors

Use of subcontractors must be clearly explained in the proposal, and major subcontractors must be identified by name. The prime contractor shall be wholly responsible for the entire performance whether or not subcontractors are used.

5. Amended Proposals

An offeror may submit an amended proposal before the deadline for receipt of proposals. Such amended proposals must be complete replacements for a previously submitted proposal and must be clearly identified as such in the transmittal letter. The Agency personnel will not merge, collage, or assemble proposal materials.

6. Offeror's Rights to Withdraw Proposal

Offerors will be allowed to withdraw their proposals at any time prior to the deadline for receipt of proposals. The offeror must submit a written withdrawal request signed by the offeror's duly authorized representative addressed to the Procurement Managers.

The approval or denial of withdrawal requests received after the deadline for receipt of the proposals is governed by the applicable procurement regulations.

7. Proposal Offer Firm

Responses to this RFP, including proposal prices, will be considered firm for one hundred twenty (120) days after the due date for receipt of proposals or ninety (90) days after receipt of a best and final offer if one is submitted.

8. Disclosure of Proposal Contents

The proposals will be kept confidential until a contract is awarded. At that time, all proposals and documents pertaining to the proposals will be open to the public, except for the material that is proprietary or confidential. The Procurement Managers will not disclose or make public any pages of a proposal on which the offeror has stamped or imprinted "proprietary" or "confidential" subject to the following requirements.

Proprietary or confidential data shall be readily separable from the proposal in order to facilitate eventual public inspections of the non-confidential portion of the proposal. Confidential data are normally restricted to confidential financial information concerning the offeror's organization and data that qualify as a trade secret in accordance with the Uniform Trade Secrets Act [§57-3A-1 to 57-3A-7 NMSA 1978]. The price of products offered or the cost of services proposed shall not be designated as proprietary or confidential information.

If a request is received for disclosure of data for which an offeror has made a written request for confidentiality, the Procurement Managers shall examine the offeror's request and make a written determination that specifies which portions of the proposal should be disclosed. Unless the offeror takes legal action to prevent the disclosure, the proposal will be so disclosed. The

proposal shall be open to public inspection subject to any continuing prohibition on the disclosure of confidential data.

9. No Obligation

The procurement in no manner obligates the State of New Mexico or any of its agencies to the eventual rental, lease, purchase, etc., of any equipment, software, or services offered until a valid written contract is awarded and approved by appropriate authorities (including the DoIT, State Purchasing Division, DFA/CRB and Federal authorities).

10. Termination

This RFP may be canceled at any time and any and all proposals may be rejected in whole or in part when the Agency determines such action to be in the best interest of the State of New Mexico.

11. Sufficient Appropriation

Any contract awarded as a result of the RFP process may be terminated if sufficient appropriations or authorizations do not exist. Such termination will be effected by sending written notice to the contractor. The Agency's decision as to whether sufficient appropriations and authorizations are available will be accepted by the contractor as final.

12. Legal Review

The Agency requires that all offerors agree to be bound by the General Requirements contained in this RFP. Any offeror concerns must be promptly brought to the attention of the Procurement Managers.

13. Governing Law

This procurement and any agreement with offerors that may result shall be governed by the laws of the State of New Mexico.

14. Basis for Proposal

Only information supplied by the Agency in writing through the Procurement Manager or in this RFP should be used as the basis for the preparation of offeror proposals.

15. Contract Terms and Conditions

The contract between the Agency and a contractor will follow the format specified by the Agency and contain the terms and conditions set forth in Appendix B, "Agreement Terms and Conditions." However, the Agency reserves the right to negotiate with a successful offeror provisions in addition to those contained in this RFP. The contents of this RFP, as revised and/or supplemented, and the successful offeror's proposal will be incorporated into and become part of the contract.

Should an offeror object to any of the Agency's terms and conditions, as contained in this Section or in Appendix B, that offeror must propose specific alternative language. The Agency may or may not accept the alternative language. General references to the offeror's terms and conditions or attempts at complete substitutions are not acceptable to the Agency and will result in disqualification of the offeror's proposal.

Offerors must provide a brief discussion of the purpose and impact, if any, of each proposed change followed by the specific proposed alternate wording.

16. Offeror's Terms and Conditions

Offerors must submit with the proposal a complete set of any additional terms and conditions that they expect to have included in a contract negotiated with the agency.

17. Contract Deviations

Any additional terms and conditions that may be the subject of negotiation will be discussed only between the Agency and the selected offeror and shall not be deemed an opportunity to amend the offeror's proposal.

18. Offeror Qualifications

The Evaluation Committee may make such investigations as necessary to determine the ability of the offeror to adhere to the requirements specified within this RFP. The Evaluation committee will reject the proposal of any offeror who is not a responsible offeror or fails to submit a responsive offer as defined in §13-1-83 and §13-1-85 NMSA 1978.

19. Right to Waive Minor Irregularities

The Evaluation Committee reserves the right to waive minor irregularities. The Evaluation Committee also reserves the right to waive mandatory requirements provided that all of the otherwise responsive proposals fail to meet the same mandatory requirements and/or doing so does not otherwise materially affect the procurement. This right is at the sole discretion of the Evaluation Committee.

20. Change in Contractor Representatives

The agency reserves the right to require a change in contractor representatives if the assigned representatives are not, in the opinion of the Agency, meeting its needs adequately.

21. Notice

The Procurement Code, §13-1-28 through §13-1-199 NMSA, imposes civil and misdemeanor criminal penalties for its violation. In addition, the New Mexico criminal statutes impose felony penalties for bribes, gratuities, and kickbacks.

22. Agency Rights

The Agency reserves the right to accept all or a portion of an offeror's proposal including the right to purchase software or services from SPA approved price agreements.

23. Right to Publish

Throughout the duration of this procurement process and contract term, potential offerors, offerors, and contractors must secure from the Agency written approval prior to the release of any information that pertains to the potential work or activities covered by this procurement or the subsequent contract. Failure to adhere to this requirement may result in disqualification of the offeror's proposal or termination of the contract.

24. Ownership of Proposals

All documents submitted in response to the RFP shall be available to be picked up by the offerors after the expiration of the protest period with the following exception. Two complete copies of all proposals including the Best and Final Offer, if one was submitted, shall be placed into the procurement file. Those documents will become the property of the Agency and the State of New Mexico.

25. Confidentiality

Any confidential information provided to, or developed by, the contractor in the performance of the contract resulting from this RFP shall be kept confidential and shall not be made available to any individual or organization by the contractor without the prior written approval of the Agency.

The Contractor(s) agree to protect the confidentiality of all confidential information and not to publish or disclose such information to any third party without the procuring Agency's written permission.

26. Electronic Mail Address Required

A large part of the communication regarding this procurement will be conducted by electronic mail (e-mail). Offeror must have a valid e-mail address to receive this correspondence. (See also Section II.B.5, Response to Written Questions/RFP Amendments).

27. Use of Electronic Versions of this RFP

The New Mexico gross receipts tax levied on the amounts payable under this Agreement in FYXX totaling (AMOUNT) shall be paid by the Agency to the Contractor. **The total**

All invoices MUST BE received by the Agency no later than fifteen (15) days after the termination of the Fiscal Year in which the services were delivered. Invoices received after such date WILL NOT BE PAID.

C. Contractor must submit a detailed statement accounting for all services performed and expenses incurred. If the Agency finds that the services are not acceptable, within thirty days after the date of receipt of written notice from the Contractor that payment is requested, it shall provide the Contractor a letter of exception explaining the defect or objection to the services, and outlining steps the Contractor may take to provide remedial action. Upon certification by the Agency that the services have been received and accepted, payment shall be tendered to the Contractor within thirty days after the date of acceptance. If payment is made by mail, the payment shall be deemed tendered on the date it is postmarked. However, the agency shall not incur late charges, interest, or penalties for failure to make payment within the time specified herein.

3. Term.

THIS AGREEMENT SHALL NOT BECOME EFFECTIVE UNTIL APPROVED BY THE DFA. This Agreement shall terminate on **DATE** unless terminated pursuant to paragraph 4, *infra*, or paragraph 5. In accordance with Section 13-1-150 NMSA 1978, no contract term for a professional services contract, including extensions and renewals, shall exceed four years, except as set forth in Section 13-1-150 NMSA 1978.

4. Termination.

A. Termination. This Agreement may be terminated by either of the parties hereto upon written notice delivered to the other party at least thirty (30) days prior to the intended date of termination. Except as otherwise allowed or provided under this Agreement, the Agency's sole liability upon such termination shall be to pay for acceptable work performed prior to the Contractor's receipt of the notice of termination, if the Agency is the terminating party, or the Contractor's sending of the notice of termination, if the Contractor is the terminating party; provided, however, that a notice of termination shall not nullify or otherwise affect either party's liability for pre-termination defaults under or breaches of this Agreement. The Contractor shall submit an invoice for such work within thirty (30) days of receiving or sending the notice of termination. Notwithstanding the foregoing, this Agreement may be terminated immediately upon written notice to the Contractor if the Contractor becomes unable to perform the services contracted for, as determined by the Agency or if, during the term of this Agreement, the Contractor or any of its officers, employees or agents is indicted for fraud, embezzlement or other crime due to misuse of state funds or due to the Appropriations paragraph herein. *THIS PROVISION IS NOT EXCLUSIVE AND DOES NOT WAIVE THE STATE'S OTHER LEGAL RIGHTS AND REMEDIES CAUSED BY THE CONTRACTOR'S DEFAULT/BREACH OF THIS AGREEMENT.*"

B Termination Management. Immediately upon receipt by either the Agency or the

Contractor of notice of termination of this Agreement, the Contractor shall: 1) not incur any further obligations for salaries, services or any other expenditure of funds under this Agreement without written approval of the Agency; 2) comply with all directives issued by the Agency in the notice of termination as to the performance of work under this Agreement; and 3) take such action as the Agency shall direct for the protection, preservation, retention or transfer of all property titled to the Agency and records generated under this Agreement. Any non-expendable personal property or equipment provided to or purchased by the Contractor with contract funds shall become property of the Agency upon termination and shall be submitted to the agency as soon as practicable.

5. Appropriations.

The terms of this Agreement are contingent upon sufficient appropriations and authorization being made by the Legislature of New Mexico for the performance of this Agreement. If sufficient appropriations and authorization are not made by the Legislature, this Agreement shall terminate immediately upon written notice being given by the Agency to the Contractor. The Agency's decision as to whether sufficient appropriations are available shall be accepted by the Contractor and shall be final. If the Agency proposes an amendment to the Agreement to unilaterally reduce funding, the Contractor shall have the option to terminate the Agreement or to agree to the reduced funding, within thirty (30) days of receipt of the proposed amendment.

6. Status of Contractor.

The Contractor and its agents and employees are independent contractors performing professional services for the Agency and are not employees of the State of New Mexico. The Contractor and its agents and employees shall not accrue leave, retirement, insurance, bonding, use of state vehicles, or any other benefits afforded to employees of the State of New Mexico as a result of this Agreement. The Contractor acknowledges that all sums received hereunder are reportable by the Contractor for tax purposes, including without limitation, self-employment and business income tax. The Contractor agrees not to purport to bind the State of New Mexico unless the Contractor has express written authority to do so, and then only within the strict limits of that authority.

7. Assignment.

The Contractor shall not assign or transfer any interest in this Agreement or assign any claims for money due or to become due under this Agreement without the prior written approval of the Agency.

8. Subcontracting.

The Contractor shall not subcontract any portion of the services to be performed under this Agreement without the prior written approval of the Agency.

9. Release.

Final payment of the amounts due under this Agreement shall operate as a release of the Agency, its officers and employees, and the State of New Mexico from all liabilities, claims and obligations whatsoever arising from or under this Agreement.

10. Confidentiality.

Any confidential information provided to or developed by the Contractor in the performance of this Agreement shall be kept confidential and shall not be made available to any individual or organization by the Contractor without the prior written approval of the Agency.

11. Product of Service -- Copyright.

All materials developed or acquired by the Contractor under this Agreement shall become the property of the State of New Mexico and shall be delivered to the Agency no later than the termination date of this Agreement. Nothing developed or produced, in whole or in part, by the Contractor under this Agreement shall be the subject of an application for copyright or other claim of ownership by or on behalf of the Contractor.

12. Conflict of Interest; Governmental Conduct Act.

The Contractor warrants that it presently has no interest and shall not acquire any interest, direct or indirect, which would conflict in any manner or degree with the performance or services required under the Agreement. The Contractor certifies that the requirements of the Governmental Conduct Act, Sections 10-16-1 through 10-16-18, NMSA 1978, regarding contracting with a public officer or state employee or former state employee have been followed.

13. Amendment.

This Agreement shall not be altered, changed or amended except by instrument in writing executed by the parties hereto.

14. Merger.

This Agreement incorporates all the Agreements, covenants and understandings between the parties hereto concerning the subject matter hereof, and all such covenants, Agreements and understandings have been merged into this written Agreement. No prior Agreement or understanding, oral or otherwise, of the parties or their agents shall be valid or enforceable unless embodied in this Agreement.

15. Penalties for violation of law.

The Procurement Code, Sections 13-1-28 through 13-1-199, NMSA 1978, imposes civil and criminal penalties for its violation. In addition, the New Mexico criminal statutes impose felony penalties for illegal bribes, gratuities and kickbacks.

16. Equal Opportunity Compliance.

The Contractor agrees to abide by all federal and state laws and rules and regulations, and executive orders of the Governor of the State of New Mexico, pertaining to equal employment opportunity. In accordance with all such laws of the State of New Mexico, the Contractor assures that no person in the United States shall, on the grounds of race, religion, color, national origin, ancestry, sex, age, physical or mental handicap, or serious medical condition, spousal affiliation, sexual orientation or gender identity, be excluded from employment with or participation in, be denied the benefits of, or be otherwise subjected to discrimination under any program or activity performed under this Agreement. If Contractor is found not to be in compliance with these requirements during the life of this Agreement, Contractor agrees to take appropriate steps to correct these deficiencies.

17. Applicable Law.

The laws of the State of New Mexico shall govern this Agreement, without giving effect to its choice of law provisions. Venue shall be proper only in a New Mexico court of competent jurisdiction in accordance with Section 38-3-1 (G) NMSA 1978. By execution of this Agreement, Contractor acknowledges and agrees to the jurisdiction of the courts of the State of New Mexico over any and all lawsuits arising under or out of any term of this Agreement.

18. Workers Compensation.

In the event that any action, suit or proceeding related to the services performed by the Contractor or any officer, agent, employee, servant or subcontractor under this Agreement is brought against the Contractor, the Contractor shall, as soon as practicable but no later than two (2) days after it receives notice thereof, notify the legal counsel of the Agency and the Risk Management Division of the New Mexico General Services Department by certified mail.

For example, the number of students graduated or promoted who meet a minimum preset level of achievement; the number of miles of roads repaired to a minimum safety standard; or the number of criminal investigations performed that result in identification of a prime suspect.

² An accomplishment is an “outcome” measure. These indicators measure accomplishments or results that occur (at least partially) because the services were provided. For example, the percentage of students achieving a specified skill level in reading, the percentage of miles of roads in excellent, good or fair condition; or the percent reduction in serious crimes or the percent of residents who perceive their neighborhoods as safe.

Appendix C

CAMPAIGN CONTRIBUTION DISCLOSURE FORM

Pursuant to NMSA 1978, § 13-1-191.1 (2006), any person seeking to enter into a contract with any state agency or local public body **for professional services, a design and build project delivery system, or the design and installation of measures the primary purpose of which is to conserve natural resources** must file this form with that state agency or local public body. This form must be filed even if the contract qualifies as a small purchase or a sole source contract. The prospective contractor must disclose whether they, a family member or a representative of the prospective contractor has made a campaign contribution to an applicable public official of the state or a local public body during the two years prior to the date on which the contractor submits a proposal or, in the case of a sole source or small purchase contract, the two years prior to the date the contractor signs the contract, if the aggregate total of contributions given by the prospective contractor, a family member or a representative of the prospective contractor to the public official exceeds two hundred and fifty dollars (\$250) over the two year period.

Furthermore, the state agency or local public body shall void an executed contract or cancel a solicitation or proposed award for a proposed contract if: 1) a prospective contractor, a family member of the prospective contractor, or a representative of the prospective contractor gives a campaign contribution or other thing of value to an applicable public official or the applicable public official's employees during the pendency of the procurement process or 2) a prospective contractor fails to submit a fully completed disclosure statement pursuant to the law.

THIS FORM MUST BE FILED BY ANY PROSPECTIVE CONTRACTOR WHETHER OR NOT THEY, THEIR FAMILY MEMBER, OR THEIR REPRESENTATIVE HAS MADE ANY CONTRIBUTIONS SUBJECT TO DISCLOSURE.

The following definitions apply:

“Applicable public official” means a person elected to an office or a person appointed to complete a term of an elected office, who has the authority to award or influence the award of the contract for which the prospective contractor is submitting a competitive sealed proposal or who has the authority to negotiate a sole source or small purchase contract that may be awarded without submission of a sealed competitive proposal.

“Campaign Contribution” means a gift, subscription, loan, advance or deposit of money or other thing of value, including the estimated value of an in-kind contribution, that is made to or received by an applicable public official or any person authorized to raise, collect or expend contributions on that official's behalf for the purpose of electing the official to federal, statewide or local office. “Campaign Contribution” includes the payment of a debt incurred in an election campaign, but does not include the value of services provided without compensation or unreimbursed travel or other personal expenses of individuals who volunteer a portion or all of their time on behalf of a candidate or political committee, nor does it include the administrative or solicitation expenses of a political committee that are paid by an organization that sponsors the committee.

“Family member” means spouse, father, mother, child, father-in-law, mother-in-law, daughter-in-law or son-in-law.

“Pendency of the procurement process” means the time period commencing with the public notice of the request for proposals and ending with the award of the contract or the cancellation of the request for proposals.

“Person” means any corporation, partnership, individual, joint venture, association or any other private legal entity.

“Prospective contractor” means a person who is subject to the competitive sealed proposal process set forth in the Procurement Code or is not required to submit a competitive sealed proposal because that person qualifies for a sole source or a small purchase contract.

“Representative of a prospective contractor” means an officer or director of a corporation, a member or manager of a limited liability corporation, a partner of a partnership or a trustee of a trust of the prospective contractor.

APPENDIX D

New Mexico Employees Health Coverage Form

1. For all contracts solicited and awarded on or after January 1, 2008: If the offeror has, or grows to, six (6) or more employees who work, or who are expected to work, an average of at least 20 hours per week over a six (6) month period during the term of the contract, offeror must agree to:
 - (a) have in place, and agree to maintain for the term of the contract, health insurance for those employees and offer that health insurance to those employees no later than July 1, 2008 if the expected annual value in the aggregate of any and all contracts between Contractor and the State exceed one million dollars or;
 - (b) have in place, and agree to maintain for the term of the contract, health insurance for those employees and offer that health insurance to those employees no later than July 1, 2009 if the expected annual value in the aggregate of any and all contracts between Contractor and the State exceed \$500,000 dollars or
 - (c) have in place, and agree to maintain for the term of the contract, health insurance for those employees and offer that health insurance to those employees no later than July 1, 2010 if the expected annual value in the aggregate of any and all contracts between Contractor and the State exceed \$250,000 dollars.
2. Offeror must agree to maintain a record of the number of employees who have (a) accepted health insurance; (b) decline health insurance due to other health insurance coverage already in place; or (c) decline health insurance for other reasons. These records are subject to review and audit by a representative of the state.
3. Offeror must agree to advise all employees of the availability of State publicly financed health care coverage programs by providing each employee with, as a minimum, the following web site link to additional information <http://insurenemexico.state.nm.us/>.
4. For Indefinite Quantity, Indefinite Delivery contracts (price agreements without specific limitations on quantity and providing for an indeterminate number of orders to be placed against it); these requirements shall apply the first day of the second month after the offeror reports combined sales (from state and, if applicable, from local public bodies if from a state price agreement) of \$250,000, \$500,000 or \$1,000,000.
