SECTION III: NARRATIVE

BILL SUMMARY

Synopsis: SB71 requires that state agencies shall identify and prioritize sub-programs within its performance-based budget request that are evidence-based, research-based, and promising. SB71 also establishes a procedure for compiling and submitting program inventories.

ADMINISTRATIVE ISSUES

In some cases, SB71 would require significantly more resources to develop budget requests than in the past. The Public Education Department consistently makes budget recommendations that are evidence-based, research-based, cost-beneficial and promising. However, programs that are operational in nature, such as accountability and oversight, may have issues complying with the provisions in SB71.

SIGNIFICANT ISSUES

SB71 defines and requires the use of “evidence-based,” “research-based,” “cost-beneficial,” “promising,” and “sub-program” as identifiers for elements of agency performance-based program budget requests. SB71 requires that agencies’ performance-based budgets indicate the amount of the budget recommendation intended for programs identified as evidence-based, research-based, or promising.

SB71 also requires that agencies complete an inventory of programs selected by the state budget division of the Department of Finance and Administration and submit the results of the inventory as part of the performance-based budget requests. These inventories shall include:

- Identification of sub-programs as evidence-based, research-based, promising, or lacking evidence of effectiveness;
- Sub-program goals and objectives;
- Current and historical budget and spending data;
- Target populations served;
- Number of people served;
- Outcome data demonstrating effectiveness and efficiency;
- Evaluation or audit results; and
- Data demonstrating that the sub-program is or is likely to be cost-beneficial in New Mexico, with cost beneficial programming defined as one for which the cost savings and benefits realized over a “reasonable” period of time are greater than implementation costs.

PERFORMANCE IMPLICATIONS

SB71 establishes certain administrative and procedural requirements regarding program evaluation and reporting to the state budget division of DFA, which may require additional staff resources or funding at certain agencies, depending on whether or not this type of program evaluation is already done at a given agency.
